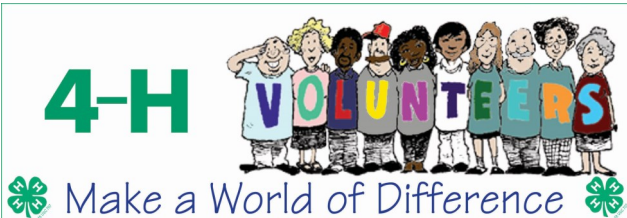


What is 4-H?

4-H is the largest out-of-school youth development program in the state and nation. The organization provides educational opportunities for youth to build life skills, including decision making, communication, leadership, sportsmanship, and responsibility through service learning, club work, and hands-on projects. 4-H has the ability to give youth confidence in themselves and opens the door for many opportunities. Projects allow youth to work in specific areas including Aerospace, Swine, Woodworking, and Robotics, just to name a few. 4-H involves the entire family and offers something for everyone.

Who can join?

4-H is for everyone! People of all ages can get involved. 4-H members are 8-18 years old. The Cloverbud program is for youth 6-8 years old. 4-H age is determined by October 1. 4-H also utilizes many adult volunteers.



Can adults get involved?

Absolutely! Volunteers are the heart of the 4-H program. The program is made possible through their dedication to youth. Adults can join to support the program through project work, clubs, activities or events. Adult volunteers serve as a guide and mentor by teaching youth practical life skills. Volunteers working with youth have completed a background check



What is a 4-H Club?

Once you decide to be involved in 4-H, it's time to find a club that is the best fit for you. 4-H members in Lewis & Clark County must be part of a club. An 4-H club is a group of members from a variety of ages and backgrounds who come together to plan club activities for projects, community service, recreation and learning. What is a 4-H Project?

After you select a club, you will also select projects to be involved in. There are over fifty different projects to choose from. Each project allows youth to explore through hands-on learning and youth-adult partnerships. Projects range from Dog to Shooting Sports to Sewing & Textiles to Photography. 4-H members have an opportunity to showcase their project, typically at the County Fair.
